1) Give curb appeal a second look

When selling your home in spring, it is critical that your yard and landscaping are in prime condition. Buyers formulate a lasting first impression of houses within the first 60 seconds. Think about the physical exterior of your house as well. Simple tasks such as power washing the siding, repainting the front door or even adding a new welcome mat can freshen up the outside of your home and make it more welcoming for potential buyers.

2) Freshen up your closet

If you keep all of your clothes in your closet year round, put away your winter clothes for showing. Sweaters, coats and bulky winter clothes take up more space in closets that, in turn, make them look smaller than they are. Buyers want to see the "fantasy" version of your home, so have the spring wardrobe present in the closet to add consistency to the appearance of your home.

3) Be reasonable when setting a

price Spring is one of the best times to list your home, however, many buyers will not even tour a home that is substantially out of their price range, so don't eliminate your home from their list of choices by overpricing. 4) Open the windows

windowsills, which often get neglected, are sufficiently dusted.

5) Double check for spider webs

Even if you have dusted every square inch of your home, walk through your home with the lighting set the way you intend it to be for a showing. This gives you the opportunity to see your home from the angle potential buyers would, and allow you to spot those elusive spider webs.

6) Deep clean your carpets

If you have already done your spring cleaning, there is a chance additional dust has also reached your carpet as it was removed from other surfaces within your home. Deep clean your carpets to remove any subtle odors and refresh a room.

7) Incorporate bright, spring colors wherever possible

Consider swapping out dark accent pillows and rugs for vibrant spring-colored accents. Since colors dramatically dictate the feel of a room, bright colors add warmth and comfort to your home and help others envision themselves living

there. This can also be incorporated into other rooms of the home. In the bathroom consider using seasonally colored towels. In the kitchen, place a bowl of seasonal fruit on the counter instead of the bowl with keys!

8) Integrate spring smells around your home

In the movies, they joke about the smell of fresh baked cookies being welcoming, but there is something to be said about appealing to multiple senses. Invigorating spring scents can easily be incorporated through candles, air fresheners or diffusers. To subtly bring in these scents add fresh flowers in various rooms of your home, as they can double up as seasonal decor.

9) Provide water for guests

Recipe of the Month

Ingredients

2 1/2 cups fresh asparagus, cut diagonally into 1-inch pieces

1/2 cup frozen green peas

3 center-cut bacon slices, chopped

3 tablespoons cider vinegar

1 tablespoon unsalted butter

2 teaspoons whole-grain Dijon mustard

1 3/4 cups Ginger-Coconut Quinoa

1 teaspoon black pepper

1/2 cup chopped fresh flat-leaf parsley

1 tablespoon chopped fresh tarragon 1 tablespoon fresh thyme leaves 5 ounces baby spinach

3 tablespoons sliced almonds, toasted

Directions

1. Bring a large saucepan filled with water to a boil. Add asparagus and peas; boil 2 minutes. Drain. Plunge into a bowl of ice water; drain.

2. Cook bacon in a large skillet over medium-high heat 4 minutes, stirring occasionally. Remove bacon from pan with a slotted spoon; set aside. Add vinegar, butter, and Dijon mustard to drippings in pan, stirring with a whisk until butter melts. Add quinoa and pepper to pan; cook 1 minute. Place quinoa

mixture in a medium bowl; add asparagus mixture, parsley, tarragon, thyme, and spinach, tossing to combine. Divide quinoa mixture among 4 plates; sprinkle evenly with reserved bacon and almonds.

Kids Corner



From the blog dillydaliart.com comes this fun and colorful planter project that is bound to brighten up your garden this spring. Here's what you'll need:

6" terra cotta pots and 8oz bottles of acrylic paint, a cardboard box or corrugated cardboard, masking tape, and an outdoor space in the shade to work.

First, you'll want to tape off the hole on the

bottom of the pot.



Try to be conservative with this one, the think paint will leave a jagged edge once the tape is peeled (you can sand that smooth with sandpaper if it really bothers you, but it's at the bottom of the pot so it should be fine to leave).

Now that your paint is upside down, squirt the paint directly onto the top where your covered hole is. Squirt the paint into the middle and repeat with different colors until you have the look that you want. Remember that



less is more with pour painting techniques, and you want to make sure you use just enough that the paint rolls down the sides of the pot.

When finished painting, leave your project to dry. Once dry, flip your pot over. The lip may be a little messy, just grab a brush and paint the edge to polish it off. Have a budding artist who has trouble with the pour paint technique? With a few brushes and a blank pot, he or she can turn any

edge once the tape is peeled (you can terra cotta planter into their own masterpiece. But go on, give the pour sand that smooth with sandpaper if it painting method a try!
